The Ninth Annual Statement of the Board of Trustees of the State Employees' Retirement System of Illinois, presented herewith, records the results of operations of the System for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1952 and includes a report on the principal developments in the administration of the System during the year. Financial statements and a report by the Actuary are also presented to display the financial condition of the System at the close of the year.

RETIREMENTS

At the close of the year there were 1,074 retired members receiving service retirement allowances aggregating \$1,015,993.32 annually. The changes in the retirement roll for the year were as follows:

At the close of the year five beneficiaries of deceased annuitants were receiving payments from the System on reversionary annuities previously provided by the deceased annuitants under the optional privilege prescribed by the Act. Thirteen such elections had been made by annuitants still on the roll naming certain beneficiaries who will become eligible for reversionary annuities upon death of the retirants.



TREND IN MEMBERSHIP

The increase in the active membership of the System and in the number of service retirements since the date of establishment on January 1, 1944, is clearly illustrated by the following statistics:

The steady upward trend in the number of members is explained by the expansion of the functions of the State government during recent years. The increase in the number of retirants is concomitant to the continued operations of the System. An increase in retirants may be expected for many years until a considerably higher level is reached in the number of persons receiving annuities from the System.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The net assets of the System, constituting its reserves for the prescribed statutory obligations, amounted to \$25,174,749.92. Of the total reserves in the System at the close of the year 70.6% represented member contributions and 29.4% consisted of amounts derived from contributions made by the State of Illinois after consideration of all payments made by the System to June 30, 1952.

Total income for the year amounted to \$7,174,365.74 and expenditures for annuity, benefit and refund payments totaled \$2,216,056.77. The excess of income over expenditures for the year was \$4,958,308.97. The principal items comprising the income and expenditure account are summarized below. The amounts relating to the preceding fiscal year are given for comparison.

Financial statements reflecting the results of operation of the System for the year and verifying the above figures as to income and expenditures are presented as a part of the Accountants' Report in another part of this Annual Statement. The regular annual audit and examination of the books and accounts of the System was completed by accountants designated by the Auditor of Public Accounts pursuant to the specific provisions of the Act governing the System. A satisfactory condition in the internal operating and accounting procedures of the System is disclosed in the report of the accountants confirming the effectiveness of the policies adopted in the administration of the System.

INVESTMENTS

Total investments of the Board at the close of the year amounted to \$24,372,000.00. While the System is authorized by law to invest its reserves in United States Government Bonds, and State and municipal general obligations, all its investments to date have been confined to government securities.

The System is not concerned with the factor of tax exemption which has been largely responsible for the investor demand for State and municipal bonds during recent years. This demand has resulted in unprecedented low rates of income on these securities. The Board,



therefore, has continued to purchase United States Government Bonds at attractive prices and yields somewhat higher than the return on State and municipal securities of comparable maturities.

The average yield on the investment account for the year was 2.57% which compares with 2.50% for the preceding fiscal year.

No other investment transactions occurred during the year.

APPROPRIATION REQUIREMENTS

A report from the Actuary accompanies, this Annual Statement showing the appropriation requirements for the biennium beginning July 1, 1953. The amount recommended by the Actuary for such biennium is \$4,698,000.00. This represents an increase of 29.5% over the amount allocated to the System for the current biennial period. In the determination of these requirements effect has been given to several major factors which enter into the calculation of the appropriation, namely: (1) the persistent upward trend in membership and employees salaries; (2) the liberalizing amendments approved at the 1951 session



of the General Assembly which will result in greatly increased payments by the System; (3) the normal increases in expenditures due to the continued operations of the System; (4) earlier retirement; and (5) a decline in the rates of mortality among pensioners.

These factors are discussed in greater detail in the accompanying

Report of the Actuary.

The System has also filed a request for the regular biennial appropriation for administrative expense for the 1953-55 biennium amounting to \$401,400.00. This compares with the amount of \$320,670 for the preceding biennium, an increase of 25%. This increase is necessitated by reason of the continued broadening of the scope of operations of the System and the additional services and obligations imposed by the 1951 amendments to the Act. It should be noted, however, that this administrative appropriation for the System concerns three different operating units, namely, the State Employees' Retirement System, the Judges Retirement System and the General Assembly Retirement System. Another agency has recently been placed under the administration of this System, namely, the Social Security Unit of the State Employees' Retirement System, which was created by the General Assembly in 1951. While this new agency has a separate appropriation, a certain amount of work and responsibilities incident to its operation devolves on several members of the staff of the System. This means an added administrative burden on the System.

STANDING COMMITTEES

The three standing committees, namely, the Committee on Investments, the Policy Committee and Claims Committee, maintained by the Board to effectuate its policies in the operation of the System, continued to discharge their assigned duties in an efficient and highly satisfactory manner.

The Committee on Investments serves as adviser to the Board on all investment operations. It is composed of Roy Tuchbreiter, Chairman of the Board, Hon. William G. Stratton, State Treasurer, and Hon. Joseph Pois, Director of Finance.

The Policy Committee is charged with the duty of reviewing matters of functional procedure arising during the course of administration of the System, on which it makes reports and recommendations to the Board of Trustees. The personnel of this Committee consists of Trustee Frank N. Barker, Chairman, Trustee Charles H. Peeler and L. C. Cortright, Secretary, members. A. A. Weinberg, Actuary, serves as technical adviser to the Committee.

The Claims Committee passes upon all claims for annuities and benefits, and formulates the policy relative to administration of such claims. It is composed of Trustee Frank N. Barker, Chairman, Thor Wanless and L. C. Cortright, Secretary, members.



SOCIAL SECURITY ENABLING LEGISLATION

The Social Security Unit of the State Employees' Retirement System was established by an Act of the General Assembly, effective August 6, 1951. This agency is charged with the responsibility of administering the program on behalf of the State of Illinois. The Act established the means by which a governmental unit may optionally provide coverage of its employees under the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provisions of the Federal Social Security Act except employees who are already covered by a local retirement system operating pursuant to a statute, resolution or ordinance.

The duties of this agency consist of advising the officials of the various governmental units, desiring to provide coverage for their employees, relative to the duties and obligations of the governmental units under the program. It formulates the procedures to be followed and steps to be taken to bring about such coverage and to supervise the collection of appropriate contributions and to make remittances to the federal government. The agency has negotiated a federal-state agreement necessary to effectuate the program, as provided by the Federal Social Security Act. It has drafted a manual of procedure for use of the governmental units setting forth the obligations of the local governments and the form of the resolution or ordinance to be adopted by such units. It has also devised the records to be kept for the proper operation of the program and the periodic reports to be rendered by the particular governmental units and the remittances to be made. While it is fully prepared to carry out its duties and responsibilities under the legislative Act creating the agency, its activities have been temporarily suspended due to a lawsuit now pending in the courts challenging the constitutionality of the Act. The Circuit Court of Sangamon County in which the suit had been filed upheld the constitutionality of the legislation. Appeal from this decision has been taken by the complainants and the case is now pending in the State Supreme Court for final adjudication. It is expected that a decision will be handed down in this matter about March, 1953.

The System is keeping abreast of all developments and attempting to maintain the Social Security Unit on an operating basis so as to be prepared to proceed to give full effect to this legislation when the legal questions concerning it have been resolved and the legislation has been validated by the courts.

AMENDATORY LEGISLATION

Several changes in the provisions of the Act have been proposed by the staff of the System for presentation at the next regular session of the General Assembly. These changes are all of an administrative or



corrective character, and do not involve any substantive revisions of the Act or increases in cost burden.

Under the Act, the Board of Trustees is charged with the responsibility of formulating policy for the proper administration and operation of the System, and generally directing its affairs, pursuant to the existing provisions of the Act. The duty of administering the System is vested by law in the Secretary of the Board. Amendments to the Act have been proposed by the Board from time to time for the purpose of clarifying existing provisions and effectuating administration.

As a general proposition, the Board does not undertake to initiate legislation of a policy character calling for substantive changes in benefits or qualifying conditions and involving cost considerations. This is a matter which more appropriately can be passed upon by an agency such as the Illinois Public Employees Pension Laws Commission. Such agency is an advisory body charged with the duty of reviewing amendatory proposals affecting existing pension laws, and making recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly with reference thereto. However, the facilities of the System and the technical staff of the Board are always available for any advice and information relative to the status of any amendatory proposals dealing with the provisions of the existing plan or with respect to the evaluation of the financial implications and cost aspects of such proposals.

ACTUARIAL SURVEY AND INVESTIGATION

An actuarial valuation of the assets and liabilities of the System has been completed by the Actuary as of June 30, 1952. The results of the valuation are embodied in a report which forms a part of this Annual Statement.

As provided by the Act governing the operation of the System, a triennial actuarial survey and investigation is likewise being made by the Actuary. This consists of a study and analysis of the operating experience of the System during the three-year period ended June 30, 1952 with respect to mortality, disability, separation and other factors. Comparisons with existing standards used in operations will be made. The report on this survey will constitute a part of the records of the System and any recommendations contained therein for possible revisions of current standards, policies or provisions of the Act will be given due consideration by the Board.

CONCLUSION .

The program of annuities and benefits provided by the System covering the hazards of superannuation, death and disability, constitutes an important adjunct of a sound personnel policy for the State of Illinois as an employer. The efforts of the Board will continue to be directed,



as in the past, toward the effective operation of the System in accordance with the specific provisions of the governing Act to the end that its stated objectives may be achieved in fullest measure. Adjustments of the underlying plan of operation may be required from time to time to give effect to social and economic trends. These adjustments, if made, should be in accord with established principles in order that adequate coverage may be maintained for all occupational categories comprising the System on an equitable and nondiscriminatory basis.

In closing, acknowledgment is made of the considerate cooperation of all officers and employees of the State government who have been directly or indirectly concerned with the administration of the System, and of the faithful and conscientious service of all employees who served the System during the past year.

'ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1952

To the Board of Trustees of the State Employees' Retirement System of Illinois Springfield, Illinois

Pursuant to appointment, we have examined the balance sheet of the

STATE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM OF ILLINOIS

as of June 30, 1952, and the statements of income and expenditures and reserves for the fiscal year ending on that date.

The aforesaid statements were found to be in agreement with the general books of the System. The books reflect the accrual basis of accounting.

In connection therewith, we have reviewed the system of internal control and the accounting procedures in force and, without making a detailed audit of the transactions, we examined or tested the accounting records of the System and other supporting evidence in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

Investments of the System are all in United States Government Bonds. At the close of the year these bonds amounted to \$24,365,326.05 at amortized cost, and \$24,372,000.00 at par value. The bonds were examined by us in the vaults of the State Treasurer where they are held in safekeeping. All bonds were accounted for and were found to be registered in the name of the System.

The security and interest records kept by the System afford a satisfactory safeguard for the collection of interest as it becomes due and payable. All interest was collected when due, and all accrued interest was accounted for.

All bond purchases and exchanges were found to be properly authorized by the Board of Trustees.

We obtained from the State Treasurer, as of June 30, 1952, confirmation of the cash balance to the credit of the System's Fund Account, together with the amount of deposits in transit and the deposits made during the year, which were all reconciled to the amounts shown by the records of the System.

The accounts receivable, \$343,587.03, is made up as follows:

Members' Contributions \$343,108.68 Cancellation of Service Retirement Allowances 478.35

The accounts receivable from members' contributions, \$343,108.68, represents deductions on payrolls applicable to the month of June, 1952 which were collected in July and August, 1952. The service retirement cancellations aggregating \$478.35 represents warrants issued to annuitants who died prior to the due dates of the warrants. Of the above amount, \$413.62 was not redeposited prior to the conclusion of the audit.



We examined the members individual accounts and found that these accounts were properly kept and that the balances thereof were in agreement in the aggregate with the respective control account as maintained by the System. Effective as of July 1, 1951, the mechanics and procedures of accounting for the members' contributions by bookkeeping-machine posting operations was changed to the more flexible system of accounting developed by the International Business Machines Corporation. The operation of this new system entails the process of punching specially designed cards according to code specifications, whereby these cards are sorted and grouped by mechanized means which in turn become the medium through which the desired posting entry is made by the IBM accounting machine to the appropriate individual ledger card.

Service retirement allowances, disability benefits and death benefits granted during the year under review were approved by the Board of Trustees as evidenced by the record of proceedings of the Board. The amounts of these payments were verified by reference to the individual records and files and by tests of individual computations.

The expenses and the retirement, disability and death benefit payments and refunds were checked by reference to the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Trustees and reports of the Claims Committee. Vouchers, invoices and related memoranda were inspected in connection with the verification of the disbursements made during the period.

We made accounting tests of the current liabilities and believe they are fully disclosed in the balance sheet.

The changes during the year in the Reserve Accounts are set forth in a separate statement appended hereto. The balances of these Reserve Accounts are as follows:

Reserve for Members' Contributions—\$16,706,195.20. This represents the accumulated contributions by the members to June 30, 1952, less: (1) that portion of benefits paid representing accumulated contributions; (2) refunds to withdrawing members; and (3) accumulated contributions of annuitants.

Reserve for Interest Accumulation—\$933,657.87. This represents interest accumulated on Members' Contributions at a rate of 2% per annum, compounded annually. At the close of each fiscal year the 2% interest is calculated for each member on the basis of the year-end summary cards of the previous year. These cards are sent to the IBM Service Bureau where the interest is computed automatically and punched in the summary cards. The interest thus calculated is transferred to an individual detail card through the IBM reproducer and the detail card is included in the last posting operation of the year to the members' ledger card.

Interest credit is not computed on current year's contributions, except in the case of death benefits, on which payment thereof by the System would include interest on the current year's contributions, as well as on the balances at the beginning of each fiscal year.

Reserve for Annuitants' Death Benefits—\$160,418.75. This represents the excess, as of June 30, 1952, of accumulated contributions of individual annuitants, including interest, over the amount received as pension payments. The amount is transferred from the Reserve for Members' Contributions and Reserve for Interest Accumulations, and is determined by a yearly revaluation.

Contingent General Reserve—\$7,374,478.10. This represents (1) Contributions by the State of Illinois and amounts received from Federal Funds; (2) interest income in excess of that credited on members' contributions, and other income accruing to the System; (3) yearly transfers from Reserve for Members' Contributions of accumulated contributions of members retiring on annuity; less (4) that portion of Benefits paid which is in excess of the amount paid from accumulated members' contributions.



The definite determination that each and every eligible State employee has been included in the membership of the System, the verification of prior service credits and the amount of actuarial liabilities of the System, are items deemed to be beyond the scope of our audit.

The statements submitted herewith, showing assets and liabilities, reserves and changes therein, do not reflect their actuarial valuations, the presentation of which is incumbent upon the Actuary of the System, as required by the Act governing the operations of the System.

In our opinion, based on such examination, and subject to the comments and qualifications herein stated, the accompanying balance sheet, and the statement of income and expenditures and reserves fairly present the financial condition of the System at June 30, 1952, and the results of operations for the year ended on that date, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles consistently maintained by the System, and in accordance with the procedures prescribed by the Act governing the operations of the System.

REPORT ON THE NINTH ANNUAL VALUATION OF THE ASSETS AND LIABILITIES OF THE STATE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM OF ILLINOIS

The results of the Ninth Annual Valuation of the Assets and Liabilities of the State Employees' Retirement System of Illinois, as of June 30, 1952, are presented in this Report.

Results of Valuation

The accompanying Valuation Balance Sheet sets forth the results of this valuation and illustrates the financial condition of the System from a technical standpoint. It discloses that the total accrued liabilities at June 30, 1952 amounted to \$67,599,846.00. The net present assets on hand at June 30, 1952, to meet these liabilities, amounted to \$25,174,749.92, indicating that the accrued unfunded obligation at such date was \$42,425,096.08. This constitutes the actuarial reserve deficiency of the System. It represents a deferred obligation of the State of Illinois, to be discharged by future appropriations to the System.

In this valuation effect was given to the extensive changes in the benefit schedule and qualifying conditions created by the amendments to the Act effective July 1, 1951. These amendments consisted principally of (1) the elimination of the discount factor applicable in the case of retirement below age 65, resulting in the payment of the full retirement allowance beginning at age 60; (2) the reduction in the qualifying conditions for retirement from 15 to 8 years; (3) the reduction in the period of vesting in a retirement allowance from 15 to 8 years in the case of employees withdrawing from State service between the ages of 55 and 60 years; (4) the raising of the maximum salary measure for making contributions and for the calculation of benefits from \$4,800.00 to \$7,500.00 per year; and (5) a liberalizing change in the optional minimum retirement annuity. Other revisions in benefits involving increased cost burdens were made but these were of relatively minor significance compared with the several changes mentioned above.

Th accrued unfunded liability at June 30, 1952, amounted to \$42,425,096.08, and compares with \$33,770,120.57 at the end of the preceding fiscal year, an increase of \$8,654,975.51. Of this increase the sum of \$6,500,000.00 was due to the new amendments. The remainder was due principally to revisions in the salary schedules and an increase in membership.

Basis of Valuation

The benefit and contribution provisions used as a basis for this valuation are summarized in the appendix. The statistical data required for this valuation was compiled by the office of the System, under the direction of L. C. Cortright, Secretary, and submitted to me in proper form.

There were 5 beneficiaries in receipt of reversionary annuities totaling \$6,235.08 per year, involving a reserve liability of \$66,085.00. Also at the close of the year, there were 13 prospective beneficiaries of reversionary annuities who will become entitled to such annuities upon death of the retirants. These annuities amounted to \$13,914.00 and involved a total reserve liability of \$72,099.00.

Prior Service Liability

This liability consists of credits for service rendered prior to the establishment of the System, namely, January 1, 1944. Statistics relating to members granted these credits are as follows:

Membership Service Liability

The accrued liability for membership service consists of the credits earned by the members towards the service retirement allowances covering the period from January 1, 1944 to June 30, 1952. This liability amounted to \$27,212,482.00. The members have made appropriate contributions to the System at the established rates toward this liability. The State of Illinois is obligated by law to meet the remainder of the liability after applying member contributions. This obligation is being met in part by biennial appropriations.

The liability for membership service to be rendered after June 30, 1952, during the remainder of the assumed working lifetime of the members, amounted to \$54,854,986.00. This is designated as a future service liability to be discharged by future contributions on the part of the members and the State of Illinois.

Ordinary Death Benefit

This benefit consists of the payment of the member's accumulated contributions, and an amount equal to one-twelfth of the yearly earnable compensation of the member for the twelve months next preceding the death of the member, for each completed year of creditable service not exceeding six-twelfths of such earnable compensation. The amount of insurance represented by this benefit and the reserve liability on account thereof are as follows:

Insurance coverage during the year increased in the amount of \$3,134,418.00, due to the upward salary adjustments of the members, the revision of the maximum salary measure previously mentioned, and to a small extent to the increase in membership.

Claims processed during the year numbered 217, compared with 187 for the

preceding fiscal year.

Occupational Death

The number of beneficiaries in receipt of accidental death benefits at the close of the year was 54, involving a liability of \$1,129,775.00. The number of claims incurred during each of the last five fiscal periods was as follows:

The number of such incidents have fluctuated quite sharply during recent years. The limited experience of the System, however, does not provide a reliable basis for estimating the probable number of such incidents in the future. Our evaluation of the reserve requirements reflects a long-term average of the number of claims that might be incurred in normal operations.

The reserve for future claims, determined as of the close of the year, amounted

to \$189,332.00.

In the calculation of the reserve liabilities effect was given to the offset of Workmen's Compensation to the rate of benefit prescribed by the System.

Occupational Disability

Claims for occupational disability followed the trend in occupational deaths and showed a considerable decrease for the year, from 42 to 16. The following illustrates the number of claims arising during each of the last five years:

Because of certain policies and conditions existing within the service, the number of these claims have also shown marked fluctuations from year to year, as will be noted. Short-term fluctuations, however, cannot be accepted as indicative of the expected number of such incidents. Averages over a reasonably long period of years provide a more reliable index as to the expectancy on account of this type of benefit.

The reserve liability on account of occupational disability benefits, after making allowance for Workmen's Compensation, amounted to \$33,249.00.

Nonoccupational Disability

The number of new claims during the year was 202 compared with 190 for the preceding year. The following statistics show the trend in these claims during the last five fiscal periods:

The trend indicated above parallels the experience of other groups with this type of benefit. Payments on nonoccupational disability have been upward during recent years due to certain economic and social conditions and, in part, to the personnel policies maintained by the employers. The reserve requirements on account of this benefit at the close of the year amounted to \$399,324.00.

Withdrawal Benefits

The number of members withdrawing from the System and taking withdrawal benefits decreased during the year. The trend in number and amount of such withdrawals is illustrated by the following statistics:

Conclusion

The survey of the operating experience of the System now under way may disclose whether any changes are necessary in the standards used to measure the deaths among active and retired members, rates of interest or other basic factors used in annual valuations of assets and liabilities, or in various phases of operations of the System. The System has now completed eight and one-half years of operation, and some indications relative to underlying trends of basic factors may be obtained from this survey.

The method of financing now in effect for the System provides for the accumulation of a partial reserve, and measures the amount of the State's contribution according to pension payments projected over a period of years (after applying employee contributions) rather than upon the basis of accruing costs reflecting actuarial requirements. This method of providing for pension costs is not in accord with established principles governing the financing of pension obligations. The deferment of the obligations results in continued increases in the unfunded liabilities and does not provide a true perspective of the actual current cost of the System to the State. A revision of the method of financing the System may be proposed as a result of this survey for the purpose of bringing about a strengthening of its financial condition and to give full effect in the plan of financing to accruing obligations under the established benefit schedule.

The System is being administered efficiently in accordance with the same high standards that have characterized its administration during past years.

REPORT ON APPROPRIATION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE BIENNIUM BEGINNING JULY 1, 1953

Under the Act governing the operation of the State Employees' Retirement System, the State of Illinois is to make a contribution to the System for any fiscal year which shall be equal to the average annual expenditures for annuities and benefits for the ten years next following the year for which a contribution is to be made, after applying as a credit the accumulated contributions of the members on account of whom such expenditures were made. The requirements from the State of Illinois for each of the two fiscal years comprising the biennial period beginning July 1, 1953, determined in accordance with this method of financing, are as follows:

These amounts represent the computed obligation of the State of Illinois for the aforesaid years after giving effect to the requirements on account of employee members of the System whose salaries are paid in whole or in part from federal funds. The revenue needs on account of these employees was equal to 11.7867% of the total contributions required by the System for the biennium. This rate represents the proportion of salary payments from federal funds which form a part of the aggregate salaries paid all members of the System. The several items comprising the appropriation requirements are summarized as follows:

Basic Factors in the Determination of Appropriation Requirements. The appropriation requirements for the biennium beginning July 1, 1953 of \$4,698,000.00 are 29.5% larger than the amount for the current biennium. The factors responsible for this increase may be briefly summarized as follows:

- (1) Membership. The membership of the System has been in a continuous and persistent upward trend since the establishment of the System on January 1, 1944. Further increases in membership have been anticipated, and provision for this factor has been made.
- (2) Salaries. The amounts of retirement annuities payable by the System are predicated upon the highest average annual salary for five consecutive years within the last ten years prior to retirement. Provision has been made for regular merit increases in salaries under existing schedules for established grades and for possible general increases for all members of the System, in keeping with rising living costs.
- (3) Mortality. A declining trend in future years in mortality among annuitants has been anticipated in accord with the general experience among retirement systems. While the standards now in use by the System appear to be adequate at this time, changes to lower rates will in all probability be necessary in future years.
- (4) Liberalizing Amendments. A number of amendments were made in the Act at the 1951 session of the General Assembly increasing substantially the cost requirements of the prescribed benefits. Liberalizing changes in qualifying conditions and other provisions have brought about higher costs which will be translated in future years into considerably larger expenditures by the System. Provisions for these changes have been made in projecting the estimated expenditures by the System for the next ten years in the computation of the appropriation requirements for the biennium in question.
- (5) Early Retirement. Possible retirement at earlier ages than has occurred during the relatively short period of operation of the System has been considered in the determination of this appropriation. This development may bring about greater retirements and larger payments by the System.

Recommendation. It is hereby recommended that the amount of appropriation to be requested from the State of Illinois for the State Employees' Retirement System of Illinois covering the biennium beginning July 1, 1953 shall be \$4,698,000.00, in accordance with the method of financing prescribed by the Act governing the System.

APPENDIX

SUMMARY OF BENEFIT AND CONTRIBUTION PROVISIONS OF STATE EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT ACT

Note: This summary sets forth in brief the principal provisions of the plan of operation underlying the System but is not to be accepted as a substitute for the applicable law. The law must be considered as controlling under all circumstances.

BENEFITS

1. Service Retirement Allowance

Retirement is optional with a member upon attainment of the age of 60 years, provided at least 8 years of service has been completed.

Retirement is compulsory upon attainment of the age of 70 years if 15 years of service has been rendered, or upon the completion of 15 years of service after attainment of such age. The compulsory retirement provision became effective on January 1, 1949.

In the case of a member withdrawing from service prior to the age of 55 years a vested interest in a retirement allowance attaches upon completion of 15 years of service. If the member withdraws from service upon or after attainment of the age of 55 years, a vested right is established if he has 8 years of service or more.

The allowance consists of the following:

- (a) An annuity which is equal to 1/120th of average final compensation for each year of membership service, i.e., service after January 1, 1944.
- (b) A State annuity equal to 1/120th of average final compensation of the member for each year of membership service, not to exceed 35 years.
- (c) A prior service annuity equal to 1/60th of average final compensation for each credited year of prior service, i.e., service before January 1, 1944, not to exceed 35 years.

Limitations and Guarantees. A service retirement allowance to any member cannot exceed 60% of average final compensation, provided that the service retirement allowance to any member who was in service on July 1, 1951 cannot be less than the amount to which he was entitled under the provisions of the Act in effect prior to that date.

Estimating Retirement Allowance. The retirement allowance set out in the foregoing paragraphs labeled (a), (b) and (c) is equal to 12/3% of average final compensation multiplied by the total number of years of credited service subject to the limitation as to prior service.

Optional Minimum Benefit. An optional minimum annual retirement benefit is provided for any member aged 65 years or over, having 15 years of creditable service or more, equal to 1% of average final compensation per year of credited service, plus the sum of \$25.00 for each completed year of service, subject to a minimum payment of \$780.00 per year and a maximum payment of 60% of average final compensation.

Average Final Compensation. Average final compensation is defined to mean the average annual rate of earnable compensation for the five consecutive years within the last ten years of service prior to retirement when such average was highest, subject to a maximum of \$7,500.00 per year.



Special Retirement Provision. Any member who has received Ordinary Disability Benefit for the maximum period of time specified under the plan, who has attained an age of at least 55 years and has completed at least 15 years of service, may retire and receive a retirement allowance as of his attained age, without reduction in the amount thereof because of retirement before age 65.

2. Reversionary Annuity

A member may elect to receive a reduced retirement allowance, for himself and provide an annuity for a designated beneficiary to be paid upon his death, on an actuarial equivalent basis.

3. Ordinary Disability Benefit

This benefit is available to any member under the age of 65 years who has rendered at least five years of creditable service and who has been a contributor to the System for at least 12 months.

The amount of the benefit is 40% of earnable compensation* plus a credit of 6% of earnable compensation for service retirement allowance purposes. The benefit begins on the 31st day of absence from service on account of disability, is payable during the time a member shall not receive nor have a right to receive compensation, and may extend for an aggregate period of time not to exceed one-fourth of the member's period of service at date of disability, but in no event beyond age 65.

4. Death Benefit-Death Before Retirement

The ordinary Death Benefit, payable from State contributions, is payable upon death of a member while in service provided the member has been a contributor to the System for at least one year and has been in receipt of compensation within a period of 12 months prior to the date of death, with the following exception: In the case of a member in receipt of ordinary disability benefit, death benefit coverage is provided during the entire time disability benefits are payable.

The benefit payable from State contributions is an amount equal to one month's earnable compensation* for each completed year of creditable service, not to exceed six months' salary.

5. Death Benefit Upon Death After Retirement

Upon death of a retired member, provided such member did not elect an annuity payable to his dependents after his death, a death benefit is payable to the person or persons nominated by the deceased member to receive such payment equal to the excess, if any, of the amount of his accumulated contributions at time of his retirement on service retirement allowance over the total amount of all service retirement allowance payments received by the retired member.

6. Accidental Disability Benefit

This benefit is provided to any member under the age of 65 years becoming disabled as the direct result of injuries arising out of and in the course of employment.

The benefit is equal to 60% of earnable compensation* plus a credit of 6% of earnable compensation for service retirement allowance purposes. The benefit is reduced by amounts received as Workmen's Compensation.

The benefit ceases upon termination of disability or upon attainment of age 65, whichever event first occurs. If termination of benefit is due to age, the member

^{*} Earnable compensation is defined to mean the full rate of the member's compensation including maintenance, subject to a maximum of \$7,500.00 per year.



becomes entitled to a service retirement allowance and the minimum period of service prescribed for the receipt of a retirement benefit does not apply in such a case.

7. Accidental Death Benefit

Upon death of a member as the direct result of injuries arising out of and in the course of employment, his accumulated contributions are payable in full to his beneficiary, and if a widow survives she is entitled to a benefit equal to 50% of the member's earnable compensation* which is payable during her widowhood. If there be no widow, or if the widow remarries or dies before any child of the deceased has attained the age of 18 years each such child receives a monthly allowance of \$15.00, payable until attainment of age 18. The combined payments to children are not to exceed 50% of earnable compensation* of the member.

If there be no widow nor minor children under age 18, a benefit of 50% of earnable compensation is payable to either surviving dependent parent for life. If none of the prescribed beneficiaries exist no Accidental Death Benefit is payable.

The Accidental Death Benefit is reduced by amounts received as Workmen's Compensation.

8. Refunds

Upon withdrawal from service before retirement a member is entitled to a refund of his full contributions, without interest.

CONTRIBUTIONS

By Members: The members of the System contribute at the rate of 6% of their earnings by way of salary deductions. The maximum amount of earnings considered by the System for salary deductions is \$7,500.00 per year.

By the State: The State of Illinois is obligated to meet the remainder of the cost of the benefits provided by the System and expense of administration through biennial appropriations.

ADMINISTRATION

A Board of Trustees, consisting of five members, administers the affairs of the System with the aid of a secretary. The principal functions of the Board are to resolve questions of policy, invest the reserve funds, formulate rules and regulations to implement the provisions of the law and generally institute and supervise matters of administration. The Secretary by law is the executive officer in charge of the administration of the System.



^{*} Earnable compensation is defined to mean the full rate of the member's compensation including maintenance, subject to a maximum of \$7,500.00 per year.
